PATHWAY TO SUCCESS

KARI SPIEGELHALTER AT WOMEN IN LANDSCAPE ARCHITECTURE -

As a female graduate student of landscape architecture at Cornell, it is readily apparent that, at least at the graduate level, classrooms are dominated by females – my second year class is comprised of 74% women. However, in the field of working landscape architects, these numbers become topsy-turvy. In January 2016 the American Society of Landscape Architects noted that only 36% of its members were female. So, how can women find success in the field of landscape architecture and continue to advance in the field? At October's ASLA conference in New Orleans, three accomplished women gathered to discuss this topic - Barbara Deutsch, the Executive Director of the Landscape Architecture Foundation; Christine Ten Eyck, President of Ten Eyck Landscape Architects; and Thaisa Way, Professor of Landscape Architecture at the University of Washington. Here's a four-point summary of how they think women can help themselves and help each other find success in the field of landscape architecture:

- 1) Find a mentor Seek out someone you admire and ask them for advice. Mentorship experiences can be one-time or ongoing relationships.
- 2) Make it a goal to say something. While meetings and classroom discussions can be intimidating, it is better to contribute your thoughts, (even if they're undeveloped or unpopular), than to be invisible.
- 3) Commit to do more than you think you know how to do. Trust your ability to learn and adapt as problems present themselves.
- 4) Help other women and minorities achieve success. Don't let competition get the best of you. Go out of your way to lift others to meet their goals.
